Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe Sues over Sewer Spill

The Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe has filed a lawsuit seeking punitive damages following a sewer spill that went unreported according to state officials. The Tribe is suing Silverwing, the developer of the Atrium Apartments in Sparks, and SWD-Quarry, which is identified as the owner of the building. Records show a construction crew mistakenly connected a sewer line from the apartment to the city storm drain in 2023. That storm drain empties into the Truckee River.



The Tribe learned about it when they saw our story on KRNV News 4.

“Defendants concealed the discharge to avoid enforcement and public scrutiny,” according to the suit. A lawyer for Silverwing points out NDEP investigated the spill and did not find any ongoing concerns. Silverwing paid \$33,000 to settle its claim with the state over this issue. The city of Sparks has appealed its Notice of Violation from NDEP.

The lawsuit was filed in Washoe District Court.

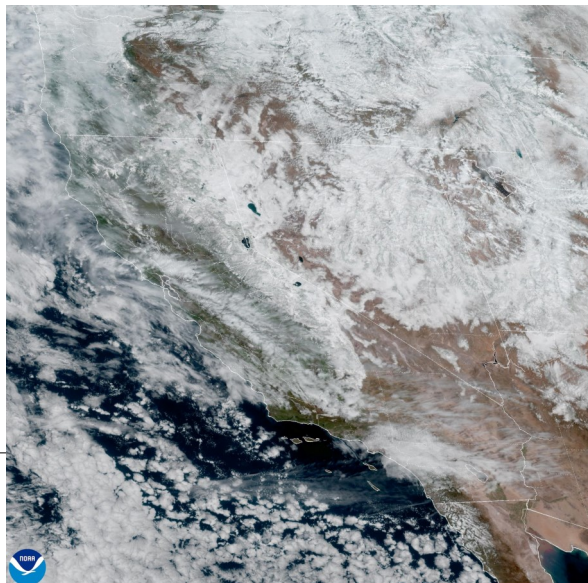

If you are age 18 by **March 31, 2026**, and on the approved list of eligible Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribal members per Resolution PL#34-18, then you are eligible to apply for the Minor's Trust. (See Resolution on our website at plpt.nsn.us/enrollment). This is for those enrolled as a Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribal member and living as of April 6, 2018/December 6, 2024.)

- Minors will have up to six years to complete their forms and claim their economic stimulus payment. The deadline to submit your forms for this 1st Quarter of 2026 is on the last Tuesday of March 2026. Applications received by 03/31/2026 will be processed and forwarded to the Trust the next business day.

• Tribal members under the age of 18 will have their economic stimulus payment placed in a trust account to be managed by the Trust until they reach 18 years of age.

- Members who will receive their payment from the Minor's Trust can expect distributions within 4 months after the end of the calendar quarter (March, June, September, or December) after they return the completed and signed application.

• Members who have an account in the Minor's Trust will have six years to claim their economic stimulus payment, from the date of their 18th birthday.

- June 2, 2025: **For those who have turned 18 after December 6, 2024, your 2024 Christmas Distribution Funds were placed into the trust, so you will have to follow these guidelines to obtain your funds.**

Funds will be received at least 4 months after quarter deadline. Please plan accordingly.

1. All Minors' Applications are processed at the same time – turning in a form earlier than the deadline doesn't ensure a faster result.

NOTE: **You may turn in your form earlier, but it will be held until the appropriate Quarter Deadline your birthday falls under.**

3. The whole process goes from receiving and verifying your information with our PLPT Enrollment office, which includes verifying Enrollment numbers, social security numbers and updated addresses. The paperwork is then submitted to the Trust Company, where it is then processed. The Trust Company then submits their completed forms to the Bank, and after verification with the bank, your money will THEN be distributed – this sometimes takes up to 4 MONTHS. Please plan accordingly, and expect that your money will arrive 4 MONTHS after the Quarter Deadline.

4. The Trust company will contact the PLPT office for more information according to their standards – your contact information needs to be legible just in case we need to reach you. If you can't be reached, your form will be held until you contact us.

Curator for Divorce Ranches Displays

The Pyramid Lake Museum is requesting bids from interested individuals to design 2 displays representing Divorce Ranches on the Pyramid Lake Paiute Reservation, Nevada. The displays will include research information from the dissertation of Audrey Andrews for a permanent display at the Pyramid Lake Museum and a traveling display for other museums in the State of Nevada.

Selected curator will develop: 1) A display at the Pyramid Lake Museum with text, photos and audio recording; 2) A traveling display with text and photos. Both displays will highlight findings based on dissertation research information. The goals and objectives of the displays are to share the interesting history of Divorce Ranches in Northern Nevada, and specifically the ranches located within the boundaries of the Pyramid Lake Paiute Indian Reservation.

The Pyramid Lake Museum is the only tribal museum in the State of Nevada. The museum shares the history and culture that promotes appreciation and respect for the Numu (Paiute people), land, water, and resources. The lake, known as a “Gem in the Desert,” has spiritual significance. The lake and the museum were recently named as one of the “Top 10 Indigenous Experiences in 2025” by the American Indian/Alaska Native Tourism Association.

DEADLINE FOR BID SUBMISSION: Friday, March 13, 2026.

Interested individuals will provide a written bid and a Resume with experience and qualifications to Billie Jean Guerrero, Museum Director, by the deadline listed above. Q & D Construction Update at CEMEX Rock Quarry

Big things are taking shape north of Interstate 80 near Fernley as Q&D Construction continues its work at the CEMEX rock quarry. Partnering with CEMEX, our team is reclaiming a quarry that had filled with water in recent years—transforming it back into usable ground through careful planning, innovation, and execution. After building an access road last October, crews have been steadily backfilling the quarry pond. A major milestone has been the assembly of a floating conveyor system, allowing material placement away from the shoreline while safely constructing an underwater 3-to-1 slope. It's a unique solution that keeps progress moving while maintaining stability beneath the surface.

This three-phase project is on track for completion later this year, and we're proud of the ingenuity and dedication our crews continue to demonstrate in the field.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Is 988 only for suicide-related crises?

No. In addition to thoughts or feelings of suicide, 988 responds 24/7 to calls, chats, or texts from anyone who needs support for mental health, suicide, and/or substance use problems. Other reasons include emotional distress, anxiety, depression, mental illness, loneliness, trauma, bullying, stress, relationship troubles, and just needing someone to talk with.

If I contact 988, will police or emergency services show up?

988 counselors work to keep you safe and provide support in the least restrictive manner possible. For most people, a counselor is able to work with you on the call, text, or chat to de-escalate your situation. If there is an immediate physical safety threat, the 988 counselor will contact 911 to help.

Can I call 988 for or about someone else?

Yes, 988 crisis counselors provide caring support and resources for family, friends, caregivers, and advocates who reach out about another person they are concerned about.

Does contacting 988 really help?

Yes, numerous studies have shown that most people who contact 988 are significantly more likely to feel less depressed, less suicidal, less overwhelmed, and more hopeful after speaking to a 988 crisis counselor.

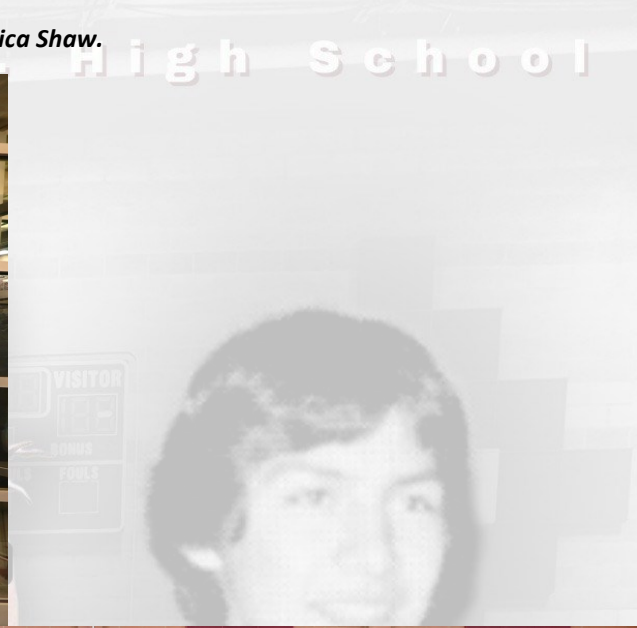
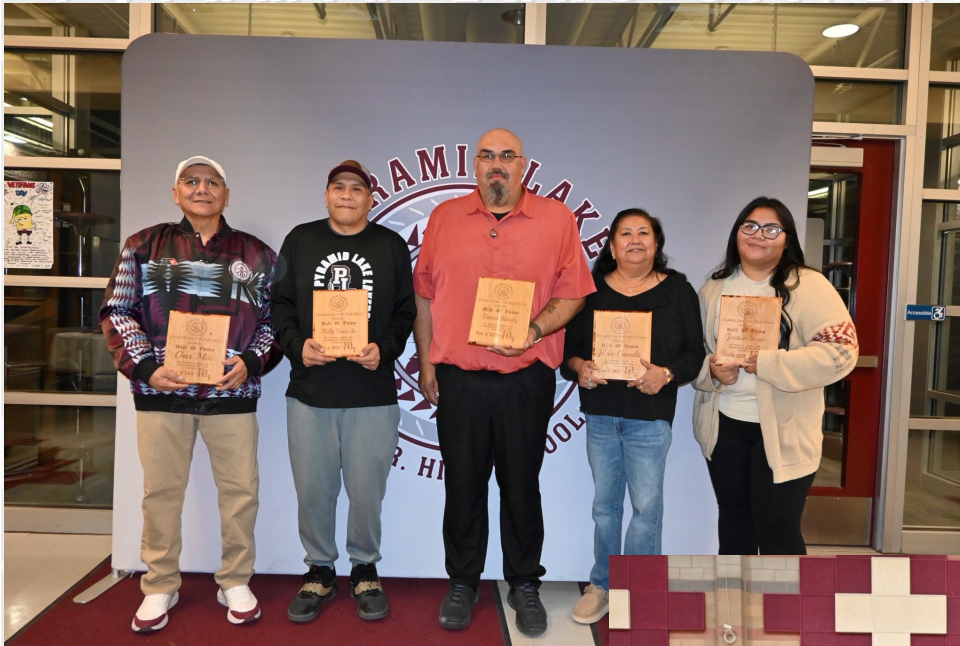

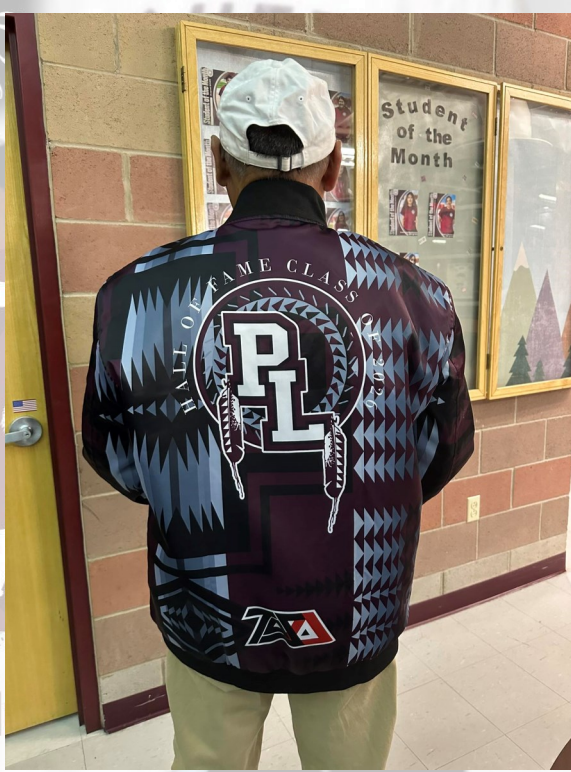
Pyramid Lake High School, January 29, 2026-

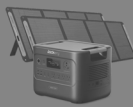

Community Energy Fair

When: March 19th 5-7 pm

Where: Wadsworth Community Center

Background: The Tribe was awarded the BIA Tribal Community Resilience grant to fund a feasibility study for a potential microgrid on the Reservation. The study's purpose is to evaluate the viability of building a microgrid for eight tribal facilities including the Food Distribution Center, Health Clinic, Police Department, Natural Resources and Water Department, Tribal administration building, Transit Facility, Emergency Management Services Building, and Sutcliffe Community Center.

A microgrid is a group of interconnected facilities and energy resources that can operate either independently or in coordination with the main electrical grid. These systems typically use technologies such as solar panels and large-scale battery storage systems installed on facility grounds to provide clean, reliable energy. Developing a microgrid on the Reservation could help reduce the Tribe's energy costs while improving energy reliability during main grid outages. In the event of a blackout, facilities connected to the microgrid could continue operating and serve as safe gathering places for the community during extreme weather events.

About the event: The Community Energy Fair is a free, all-ages event where community members can learn about the microgrid project and its potential benefits. The event will highlight the results of the feasibility study that evaluated potential options for a microgrid on the Reservation. Attendees will have the opportunity to ask questions, share feedback, and connect directly with the energy team. The fair will also feature hands-on, interactive activities, such as solar art and a wind turbine competition, offering engaging learning experiences for all ages. A free, buffet-style BBQ dinner will be provided for all attendees, along with a free raffle featuring energy-related prizes, including a solar generator, battery banks, solar lights, and a battery jump starter.

Who: This event is hosted by the business department, Benjamin John, and Energy Innovator Fellow Dr. Maxwell Mattejat.



Dr. Maxwell Mattejat is part of the Energy Innovator Fellowship program administered by Oak Ridge Institute for Science and Education and funded by the Department of Energy. Since August 2025, Maxwell has worked remotely from North Carolina with Benjamin and the business department to support the management of the Tribe's energy-related grants. He holds a Ph.D. in chemistry from the University of California Santa Barbara, where his research was focused on grid-scale batteries and nuclear fuel recycling technologies. He previously served as a fellow at the Environmental Protection Agency, contributing to a nationwide field study investigating pesticides and forever chemicals (PFAS) in residential kitchens. Maxwell brings over a decade of experience working on projects focused on protecting the environment and developing renewable energy resources.
