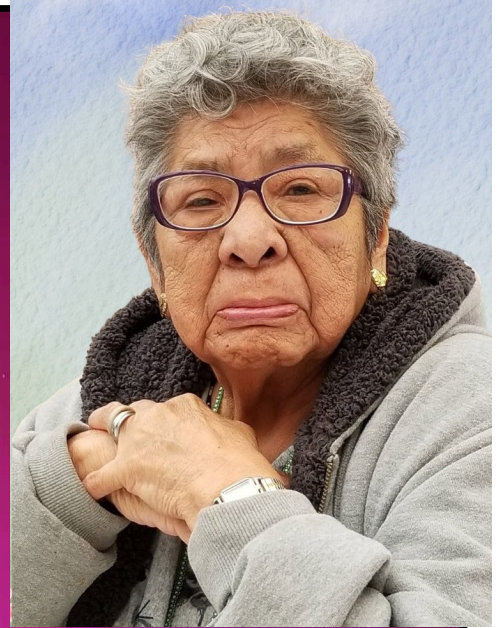

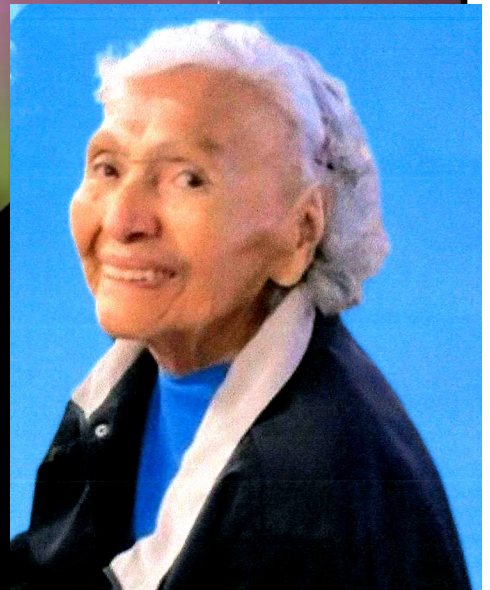

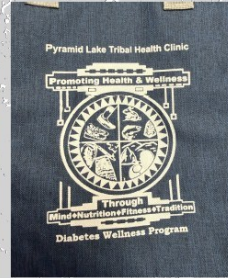

### *Reno-Sparks Indian Colony Facebook Post, May 12, 2026:*

On May 4, Senator Catherine Cortez Masto invited RSIC's Police Chief, Jarrod Nunes and three other Nevada Tribal Police Chiefs to participate in a discussion focused on MMIP (Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons) and MMIW (Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women). The meeting was organized to gather direct input from Tribal law enforcement regarding the ongoing challenges surrounding these cases and to discuss ways Senator Cortez Masto’s office can help elevate Tribal public safety concerns at the federal level and support efforts to improve coordination, resources, and justice for Indigenous communities.

Topics discussed included the lack of funding provided by the BIA, detention funding challenges, and the unreasonable timelines associated with federal investigations (FBI) involving tribal cases.

We specifically addressed a sexual assault investigation from RSIC that took over three years to complete, highlighting the delays and obstacles Tribal Police agencies face when seeking timely justice for victims and their families.

"A big shout out to the Tulalip Tribes Tulalip News for hosting the 2026 National Tribal Forum on Air Quality! There were a lot of amazing breakout sessions, networking opportunities, and fun events including the Welcome Night hosted by Zane Jacobs.

On Wednesday, during the Virgil Masayesva Award Luncheon, two awardees were given the Virgil Masayesva Environmental Excellence Award: Tanda Roberts, Environmental Manger with the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe and Jancie Archuleta, Air Quality Program Manager for the Ute Mountain Ute Tribe.

Wednesday evening, we featured four films at the beautiful Hibulb Cultural Center in their longhouse exhibit. Thursday was field-trip day with excursions to the Qwuiloot Estuary, a Boeing Test Site, the Tulalip Fish Hatchery, and more!

The conference ended by celebrating Mansel Nelson, ITEP's Indoor Air Quality Program Manager who will be retiring at the end of the year. We look forward to seeing everyone next year for the 2027 NTFAQ at Ak-Chin Indian Community at Harrah's Ak-Chin."

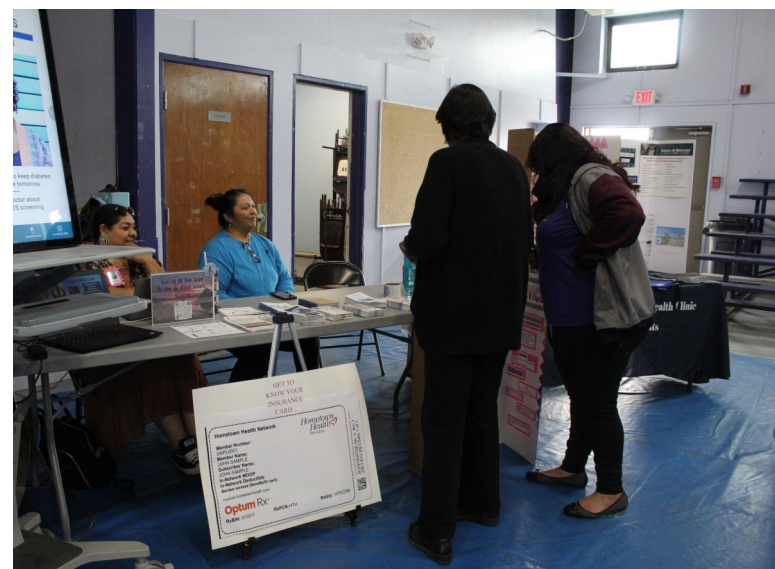

## What to Do Before, During, and After an Earthquake.

Considering the recent Earthquakes here in Northern Nevada and the aftershocks of that Earthquake, residents have been experiencing a cluster of aftershocks which include this morning's 4.1 and 5.2 magnitude Earthquakes at 1:15 and 1:17 AM in Silver Springs. Your Tribal Administration along with Emergency Management in the PLFR/EMS decided it would be helpful to remind folks about what to do Before, During and After an Earthquake. Since we will be experiencing aftershocks in the coming days, weeks, and even months. We have assembled some links below along with some basic Earthquake information to better protect you and your family. Please pass this information along and share it with neighbors and friends.

**Before an earthquake**, it is important for individuals, families, organizations, and communities to identify their risk, make a plan, create a disaster kit, and remove, relocate, or secure anything that can:

- Fall and hurt someone
- Fall and block an exit
- Fall and start a fire
- Require a lengthy or costly clean-up

**During an earthquake**, **DROP** to the ground; take **COVER** by getting under a sturdy table or other piece of furniture; and **HOLD ON** until the shaking stops. If there isn't a table or desk near you, cover your face and head with your arms and crouch in an inside corner of the building. **DO NOT RUN OUT OF THE BUILDING DURING THE SHAKING AS OBJECTS MAY BE FALLING OFF THE BUILDING AND CAUSE SERIOUS INJURIES OR DEATH.** For more information on what to do during an earthquake, visit [www.cdc.gov/earthquakes/safety/stay-safe-during-an-earthquake.html](http://www.cdc.gov/earthquakes/safety/stay-safe-during-an-earthquake.html) and [www.shakeout.org](http://www.shakeout.org)

**After an earthquake**, safely evacuate. Please note that aftershocks could happen. These additional shaking events can be strong enough to do additional damage to already weakened structures and can occur in the first hours, days, weeks, or even months after the main earthquake. Have a professional engineer or local building official inspect the structural integrity of your home and/or building for potential damages. This should also include:

- Inspecting chimneys for unnoticed damage can lead to fires. Even a few cracks that are not obvious at first glance can create an unsafe condition the next time the fireplace is used; and
- Checking for gas, electrical, sewer, and water line damages to avoid fire and hazardous leaks.
